

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

Endangered Species Spotlight: The Whooping Crane

North America's largest bird has had an incredible journey. Going from only 15 migrating individuals to 836 birds in four separate wild populations. Due to unregulated hunting, habitat loss and slow reproductive rates, the crane fell to only a dozen individuals in the 1940s. Since then, the cranes have been captively bred and have recovered to a more stable population; they still remain North America's most endangered bird, however. The only fully wild and unsustained population of whooping cranes resides in northeast Alberta's Wood Buffalo National Park (N.P.). The "Aransas-Wood Buffalo" population spends its summers in Wood Buffalo N.P. and winters in the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge in Texas. A second reintroduced population migrates between Florida and Wisconsin.

The Wilder Institute has led Canada in whooping crane conservation. Whooping cranes have been bred at the Calgary Zoo since 1992. The cranes in Wood Buffalo N.P. are being monitored via satellite imagery and remote cameras. This base helps study and account for whooping crane nests in Alberta. Studies in Louisiana are being conducted to help understand the low reproductive rate of whooping cranes. Egg analysis helps recognize the factors that lead to embryo deaths and sterile eggs.





Whooping cranes are an essential wetlands species that we need to protect. They inhabit swamps and marshes that are decreasing at a rapid rate. Crane nests are only found in shallow ponds. New oilsands development plans will threaten crucial whooping crane territory. The <u>plans</u> will contaminate essential wetlands that the cranes rest in during their migration. Whooping cranes continue to be "accidentally" shot by hunters, who confuse them for other species. This species is a glowing conservation success <u>story</u>, however, the story has not yet ended. Only 660 wild cranes exist today in increasingly sparse populations in rare habitats. We have truly saved the whooping crane from the brink of <u>extinction</u> but we have yet to finish the job. And a job left unfinished can barely be called a job at all.

PINK SHIRT DAY

PINK SHIRT DAY is February 28th, 2024

- Every year Alberta's government recognizes the third Wednesday of February as Pink Shirt Day a reminder of the impact simple and kind gestures can have on individuals and the whole community. Being kind doesn't have to be a grand gesture. It can be as simple as inviting someone to sit with your group at lunch, introducing yourself to the new person at work, sharing a toy at day-care, or choosing a game at recess everyone can participate in. It is any action that helps to create an inclusive environment where every person feels welcome and safe. This has the potential to make a tremendous impact. Did you know? "Over 75% of people say they've been bullied. Over 90% of bullying incidents have peer witnesses. But when those peers intervene, most incidents are over within 10 seconds." -https://www.pinkshirtday.ca/posters
- 17 years ago, two teenagers from Nova Scotia chose to be kind after witnessing a boy being bullied for wearing pink. Instead of staying quiet, these two bystanders handed out pink shirts at school to students and teachers to wear. This gesture sent a strong message bullying will not be tolerated at their school. This is now recognized on an international stage, and the uptake of the message around Pink Shirt Day is no longer limited to schools.
- Bullying can affect anyone, so it is important to be able to recognize bullying behaviours, and know what resources are available to support victims and bystanders. Resources like the 24-hour Bullying Helpline at 1-888-456-2323 are available if you, or someone you know, is being bullied. An online chat is also available 24/7 at Alberta.ca/BullyingChat.
- · We all have a responsibility to be kind to each other at work, home, school and in the community, and to stop bullying when we see it. This is why I am taking the opportunity today to emphasize the importance of the behaviours we choose every day. Each of our choices has the potential to make our province more inclusive. This is why the right choice is to be kind.
